Security at CCI

Shalom

At our November board meeting, we had a lengthy discussion regarding security at CCI. Below are the 5 points that were decided unanimously by our Board of Trustees.

I) We will have an armed guard at Shabbat services (Friday night and Saturday mornings), Religious School and special events.

In the last few weeks, Sgt. Hare has provided security for our community. We will continue to work with him and his colleagues to provide security at CCI. When we have services at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, this security will continue. Parents, you may want to consider speaking to your children about the security guard. Please feel free to reach out to Rabbi Linder or Jonah Berkowitz if you would like ideas on how to talk to your children about such matters.

2) Each member family will be assessed a \$100 security fee.

In the coming weeks, each family will be invoiced a \$100 security fee, to be paid over the next 90

days. If this is a hardship for you, please let the office and/or our leadership know. These funds will help with the costs of our security guard along with any other security measures that we may implement, both in the short term and in the long term.

3) Congregation Children of Israel is a gun-free facility.

According to Georgia's Safe Carry Protection Act (HB 60), firearms are only legal in houses of worship if leader's "opt-in" to the allowance of firearms on the property. Our leadership decided not to opt-in to this provision. This means that Congregation Children of Israel is a gunfree campus, with the sole exception of hired armed security. Please note that even if one is legally allowed to conceal carry a firearm, it is illegal to do so at CCI.

4) Doors will be locked during Temple events.

During Temple events, the doors will be locked. This includes (but is not limited to) adult education, meetings, and Religious School.

The security committee (details below) will work out the implementation of this.

5) We have set up a Security Committee that will meet regularly.

Upon advice from the ADL and the URJ, we will have set up a Security Committee. Among other topics, this group will look at best practices, provide suggestions and guidance, and consider ways to improve security from a combination of technology, access, and people. It's first meeting is in December.

Both of us mentioned at the board meeting, that we are thankful to be a part of the Athens community. We are blessed to have so many friends and partners that strive for all faith communities to be places of peace, sanctuary and blessing.

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From the President

Dear CCI Families and Friends



Upon returning from our whirlwind trip to the Middle East last month, I fully expected to share with you a brief and breezy travelogue about our adventures in Israel and Egypt.

Then, tragedy struck in Pittsburgh, and everything changed.

Once again, we came face to face with our vulnerability, but we also saw our resilience and the strength of our community, locally and around the world. The memorial service organized by Rabbi Linder was, in my humble opinion, one of the most moving events ever witnessed at Congregation Children of Israel. It was a great affirmation of our fortitude, and of the loving friends we have across all faith communities. I will never forget the power and beauty of more than thirty local faith leaders joining the Rabbi on the bima in a show of love and solidarity.

Here are some of the comments I shared with the congregation that evening:

"In 1790, George Washington wrote in a letter to the Touro Synagogue in Newport, Rhode Island, 'The government of the United States . . . gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance.... May the children of the stock of Abraham who dwell in this land continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other inhabitants —while every one shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig tree and there shall be none to make him afraid.'

"For much of our lives — thankfully, in many ways — we go about our daily business reassured by the safe haven we have enjoyed in our country. And then, every once in a while, we are shaken out of our routine lives by the kind of horrific events that occurred in Pittsburgh this week. "We grieve deeply for the loss of those precious lives, and we pray for some measure of meaning and peace for the families of those brutally murdered, and for all caring

citizens. As a people committed to social justice, we grieve also for our country and for the hatred and anger that seem to be tearing our country apart.

"We may despair that our efforts are insignificant, but as Mother Teresa reminded us: 'We know only too well that what we are doing is nothing more than a drop in the ocean. But if the drop were not there, the ocean would be missing something.' Let us begin to refill that ocean of hope together."

I will end with these words for now. You will see in this month's Temple Times lots of information about the day-to-day business of CCI - great work continues to go on every day. But for now, I'll limit myself to what I hope are words of consolation and healing.

New Year, New Oneg Assignment Procedures

The Friday night Oneg following Shabbat services is a cherished weekly event in our CCI community. Beginning in **January**, in order to share the responsibilities more equitably among the congregation, everyone will be assigned a date to co-sponsor an Oneg. Each family will only be responsible to host the Oneg once or twice per year.

Hosts provide snacks while congregants spend a little time together after enjoying Shabbat services. Keeping that in mind, we hope that you and your family will be able to attend the service and Oneg (and not just drop off food), but of course, this is not always possible.

IMPORTANT: In order for this alphabetical assignment method to work smoothly, the assignment stands. If you know you will be out of town for your assigned Oneg, or something comes up unexpectedly, be certain to communicate that directly to your co-sponsors to determine how

you will **contribute**. (There are no set rules, but do your share, whatever that looks like -- just don't leave anyone in the lurch.)

These are the new procedures beginning in January, 2019:

Assignments for each month's Oneg sponsors will be determined by alphabetical order by (one person in the family's) last name. Three families will be assigned to host each Oneg. [Note: Members who are not living independently, or are residing out of state, or are coping with chronic illness will not be included in the rotation. (Please inform the Oneg Coordinator or Rabbi Linder.) Likewise, B'nai Mitzvah families will not have an additional assignment since they provide each other's Onegs over the year.]

By the **15**th of the preceding month, you and your co-sponsors will receive an email designating your assigned date, so that you can communicate with one another to plan. Included will be

guidance about what needs to be provided and for how many. (For example, if you are assigned for January 2019, you will receive your email notice by December 15, 2018.)

As a reminder, you will see your name, your co-sponsors' names and the date you are hosting printed on the first page of the Temple Times newsletter for the month of your Oneg.

An additional friendly reminder will be sent via email to sponsors on Monday of the week you are hosting.

Final Note: If you have a special date in mind that you know you want to host, please tell me now, or give me plenty of notice. Don't forget to take a look at where we are in the alphabetical rotation of a given month, so I can do my best to tweak!

Thanks for supporting each other. We can do this together!

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Rabbi's Upcoming Sabbatical

I am incredibly thankful to serve a congregation that values its rabbi's continuing education and development. As a part of the wonderful partnership that I share with our congregation, I have been given sabbatical periods during this current 5-year contract.

It is customary for a rabbi in his or her 6th or 7th year to receive a sabbatical. My sabbatical will be a 4-month period, and it will be taken one month at a time over the course of four years. That first month will be this coming January 2019

During this month, I plan on serious lewish study. I also hope to read many of the books in the wonderful series called My People's Prayer Book. I will also participate in Daf Yomi (literally "daily page,") a daily study of Talmud. Both of these will undoubtedly contribute in ways big and small to my learning and my teaching. I also plan to work on my musical skills, including guitar and piano/keyboard, singing, and even recording. Jewish music is one of the things that drew me into Judaism and the rabbinate, and I'm looking forward to further developing this passion and skill.

I will use what I've learned at services and events in our calendar, especially when music is concerned. I will also find several times and programs to share my learning (s) of the Talmud and other Jewish texts.

As we enter into this month of December, if you would like to get together and talk during the month prior to my sabbatical, feel free to email me, and I will be delighted to set a time to get together before January starts. We can meet in the office or for coffee.

My gratitude to the congregation extends to our Rabbi Emeritus, Rabbi Gerson. Rabbi Gerson will be leading services three of the four weeks in January, and he will be facilitating the adult education classes at their scheduled times. Additionally, Rabbi Gerson's graciousness will extend to any life-cycle events and/or time sensitive matters. Confirmation will meet during January as scheduled, with Elizabeth Bernstein and Sammi Fuller (our AFTY advisor) facilitating classes. I cannot thank Rabbi Gerson enough, as his generosity is a wonderful gift to the life of our congregation.

I am excited about the opportunities to deeply engage in the passions of my rabbinate, and equally excited to share the fruits of this sacred time with you in the weeks, months and years that follow.

President's Note

The board is deeply committed to providing the Rabbi with opportunities to grow his knowledge and skills, and we look forward to seeing and hearing in a variety of forums how this experience has enhanced his leadership of our congregation.

Message from Rabbi Linder

Judaism has always been a religion that engages with the world. Our precepts and Mitzvot are all about what it means to live in a just, merciful society, one in which we remember that we were slaves in the land of Egypt. Most of our Mitzvot are in the category known as bein adam l'chavero, between a person and another person. In this sense, living Jewishly entails political involvement.

In recent months, as our society becomes more polarized, I try to follow our tradition's example and occasionally share my thoughts on our society and our world. When I preach, I try as best as I can to speak to the moral imperatives of Judaism, and not increase the partisan divide that already exists. That being said, I do believe that it is the job of clergy to talk about political issues from time to time.

If I ever preach about something that upsets you, I invite you to contact me so that we can find a time to talk, especially as my words reflect only one perspective, and I strive to learn from different opinions.

Just like many of you, I have strong opinions on a variety of topics, political and otherwise. At times, I share these on my personal

Facebook page. I welcome any of you to connect with me on Facebook, but also understand if you choose not to, especially as I am prone to share personal beliefs and opinions on social media that are not directly grounded in Jewish tradition.

Judaism teaches us that we should, and must, talk about difficult topics. The goal is not to necessarily agree with one another, but to listen to one another and ultimately, learn from one another.

The Miracle of Chanukah

The real miracle of Chanukah is not that oil lasted 8 days instead of one. The miracle is that despite persecution and difficulties, our ancestors would not compromise their Jewish identity. They wanted to pray, learn, celebrate, mourn, and live, as Jews.

During the holiday, we light the menorah to proclaim our Jewish identity. We should be proud to put our menorahs in the window in order to follow the Talmud's dictum to *publicize the miracle*.



There's a *midrash* that suggests that the real lights of Chanukah are not the candles that burn down. **We** are the lights. As the meaning of the holiday suggests, we re-dedicate ourselves to the ideals of Judaism, to the repair of our world, and to being an *or hagoyim*, a light unto the nations.
