Schwartz Symposium Speaker: Dale Schwartz, authority on Immigration

There is no commandment (Mitzvah) in the Torah that is repeated as often as the dictum to treat the stranger with respect, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. The immigrant experience is central to Jewish identity. As we know, it is also one of the most divisive issues in America.

Attorney Dale M. Schwartz is a principal of the Schwartz Posel Immigration Group in Atlanta. He is the past president of the American Immigration Lawyers Association, and has been on the national boards of countless organizations concerned with refugees. Dale is the son of Sanford and Florence Schwartz, who started the Schwartz Symposium.

A professor of immigration law at Emory University School of Law for 26 years, he has also been a frequent expert witness before congressional committees on immigration law. He has been featured on CNN, 60 Minutes, and other prime time TV programs as an authority on immigration.

Schwartz has dedicated time and effort to Jewish causes as an active member of the Jewish community. He has been a member of the HIAS board since 1981 serving as chairman for several years. (Founded as the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society in 1881 to assist Jews fleeing pogroms in Russia and Eastern Europe, HIAS has touched the life of nearly every Jewish family in America.)

Schwartz was a member of the Conference of Presidents of Major Jewish Organizations and was lead counsel in the famous effort to get a posthumous pardon for Leo Frank who was lynched in Georgia in 1915. In his talk at the Symposium, Schwartz will challenge common myths about immigration, including questions that are part of the current landscape: Are immigrants bad for the economy? Are they draining our welfare system? Are they

bringing in crime and drugs? He will also discuss the efforts
Congress is making to address problems created by the influx of large numbers of refugees to our shores.

The Symposium will take place at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship on April 11 at 7:00 pm. Please mark your calendar and spread the word. This will be an event you won't want to miss. It is sponsored by the Sanford and Florence Schwartz Symposium Fund and is open to the entire Athens community.



Spotlight on Giving..... Sandy and Larry Baumwald

This month, we spotlight Sandy and Larry Baumwald for their generous giving to Congregation Children of Israel's Sanctuary and Social Hall Renovation. The Baumwalds have committed to a giving level to name the choir loft. Larry, Sandy and their three children are all graduates of the University of Georgia and Sandy is a "Double Dawg" having graduated from the University's School of Law. As newlyweds, Larry became advisor to Tau Epsilon Phi, his college fraternity and Sandy was an advisor for Delta Phi Epsilon, along with friends and fellow congregants, Helene Schwartz and the late Edie Cohen.

Throughout their 40 years at CCI, the Baumwalds have been very involved in the temple. Larry was the congregation's president when the Carol Bush Education Building was built. He served on the finance committee, chaired the original renovation committee in 2008 before the financial recession, and donates the Jewish calendars for the temple each year. Sandy was the Sisterhood president twice, served on the Board of Trustees three different times, and chaired covered dish dinners and Seders.

"I traveled to Germany in 2013 and visited my father's hometown and presented my father's story to the congregation several years ago," Sandy says. "My personal highlight was being on the committee to bring the Holocaust Torah to Athens and carrying the Torah into the sanctuary at the dedication."



The Baumwalds raised their three children in Athens, as part of the CCI community. "It made me very proud that we could raise our children in a Jewish atmosphere but not feel like we were 'the other," Sandy said. "Rabbi Gerson always welcomed my children's Christian friends to the temple, and on several occasions after a spend the night party, or because someone missed their carpool, a classmate might have come to Hebrew school. Our children were heavily into middle school and high school sports, and Rabbi Gerson worked with us to make both important activities happen."

Sandy shares some of their family's favorite memories at CCI:

"My daughter, who was a late walker taking her first steps in the CCI foyer, September 1985. My youngest son's birth was on a Saturday morning, and my daughter was with one of my best friends at Tots for Torah at CCI that morning; our oldest son's Bar Mitzvah where his entire grade at Athens Academy came to the Bar Mitzvah and saw probably for the first time - what being Jewish looked like; moving tables for an Oneg when I was 9 months pregnant; making tuna salad for a Sabbath lunch with toddlers crawling at our feet, youth group conclave when our daughter was in middle school where she met large groups of Jewish kids for the first time; our youngest son's Confirmation where for the first time (and this is always a shock), your Religious School child drives himself or herself to a Temple event and does not necessarily go home with you!"

While raising their family, the Baumwalds enjoyed attending their children's sporting events. They now enjoy traveling, reading, and visiting their adult children. Their son Keith lives in Berlin, their daughter Erica lives in Atlanta, and their son Scott lives in Santa Fe.

It was important to the Baumwalds to support the Sanctuary and Social Hall Renovation.

"Both Larry and I are first generation Americans and come from families who had an excellent work ethic and a deep faith in Judaism but not the material needs to show for it," Sandy explains. "We decided that we would give extra when we could."

"I think it started when Larry got his first postage machine. I was asked to do Passover invitations. I thought it would be easier metering on the postage machine and the temple's bill came to about \$35. Instead of submitting an invoice for reimbursement, we decided to donate the postage costs. Perhaps the next time we did that was the next year's invitations—maybe they were \$75. I charged them and just "forgot" to ask for reimbursement. Then Sisterhood sponsored obtaining a small lightweight Torah. To name a book in the Torah at the dedication was \$1000.

We have three children, so we decided to name three books in

their honor. It was a stretch—by far the largest donation we had ever made, but it felt so good in a spiritual way. I'm not going to tell you that I took in ironing to make it happen, it was a huge stretch, but a pleasant one with no downside. Institutions come and go, and sadly, people come and go, but the temple is an institution that has been here for close to 140 years, and we want it to be here long after we are not."

"Community Support for Families in Crisis by Deportation." This group and the ISC are affiliated with the Immigrant Rights Coalition (AIRC). The purpose for attending was to learn how community advocates network and provide a variety of support services for immigrant families in crisis. Support is needed in a variety of ways such as providing food, clothing, and helping with rent and heating bill payments. A parent will need an occasional ride for medical services, to a court hearing, or to meet with a deportation attorney—among other needs. Many other religious groups in Athens have been regularly helping their "buddies." Many include mothers whose husbands were arrested for minor offenses and sent by ICE to be incarcerated in

the Stewart Detention Center in South Georgia awaiting a deportation hearing. I urge you to work with me to "adopt"—or support—at least one immigrant family in crisis in the Athens area. Please contact me to select a family to help. By the way, Tzedek Georgia opposes law enforcement's reporting of immigrants to ICE.

Yuval Noah Harari

In some ways, I think of this as a psychological history of humanity. I had heard of this (Israeli) author at a conference and now am super excited to read his next book.

Everything Happens for a Reason & Other Lies I've Loved,

Kate Bowler

Bowler grew up in a Christian framework known as the "prosperity gospel." This book is an evaluation of her faith that occurred once she was diagnosed with cancer.

Maimonides Life & Thought,

Moshe Halbertal

Maimonides is widely regarding as the most important Jewish thinker, philosopher and halakhist. This work examines some of Maimonides' core beliefs and writings.

Rashi, Elie Weisel

It is impossible to engage in serious Torah study without studying Rashi. Wiesel's work is a collection of Rashi's teachings and explanations.

The Talmud: A Biography,

Harry Freedman

Due to limited resources, it is recommended that those who are able to self-fund camp for their children consider not applying for camp support.

This support is for Jewish children who wish to attend a Jewish summer camp, who are active in CCI Religious School, and whose parents are members of CCI. However, please be aware that in order to be considered for this Rissman Scholarship, the Jewish summer camp your child attends must have a Jewish educational component that is part and parcel of daily activities at the camp (for example, private Jewish tutors are not enough). You are given the opportunity to describe the camp your child wishes to attend in the application below—please take the time to briefly describe the camp and its Jewish educational component/s. More than one child per family may apply, as may apply, as may those who received Rissman support previously.
